Overview

The draft revenue budget for North Northamptonshire Council was approved by the Executive on 21 December and we are now seeking views on our proposals for the next financial year.

The consultation phase is a very important one in the budget setting process as it's essential that we get the views of all the people the proposals effect before we can shape the final plans in February.

North Northamptonshire Council's budget proposals set out a detailed spending strategy for the authority for the financial year 2024/2025 as well as outlining the medium-term financial plan for the following three years.

Protecting and investing in local frontline services against a backdrop of continued national financial uncertainty is the focus of the Council's budget proposals.

The budget is not just about how to manage within available resources but also where funding should be invested, recognising residents' priorities and working with partners to jointly develop service delivery proposals, giving families strength and self-reliance so they will benefit from greater self-determination and improved life chances.

There is a balance to be maintained between encouraging growth, providing high quality universal services and protecting those that are the most vulnerable.

Financial stability is one of the cornerstones of local government and it's essential that we're in a robust and stable position if we are to deliver quality services to the people of North Northants both now and in the future.

Our commitment to maintain vital service provision has seen the Council invest an additional £53.4million into services, including adult social care and children's services to protect the most vulnerable in communities and address a growing need for services.

These pressures are, in part, offset by savings, efficiencies and further income of £18.5m. Taken together with an improvement in funding expected from business rates, Council Tax and government grants the Council has been able to set a balanced budget for 2024/2025.

The proposed net revenue budget for 2024/2025 is £371.5 million. This money provides a range of services to residents and businesses across the area including care to vulnerable adults and children, education, the disposal and collection of waste, highways maintenance, economic development, housing and support for those that are homeless.

We are also proposing a programme of capital investment totalling £163.5m over the fouryear period 2024-28 across a number of schemes including investing over £49.1m into our highways, £12.2m for our schools, £10.7m to support disabled facilities, £9.1m in improving our digital infrastructure, £2.7m from the Corby Town Fund and £2.9m for Electrical Vehicle infrastructure.

We continue to be cautious with our finances and continue to work to deliver efficiency savings, innovate, improve services and to attract funding from outside of the area.

Our call for funding certainty

There is much uncertainty regarding Local Government funding in future years with potentially a new funding regime being implemented from 2026-2027.

This brings substantial risk to areas, such as North Northamptonshire, that have experienced a significant increase in their business base as those that have delivered most in terms of business rates growth could stand to be the most adversely affected through changes in Government funding.

We have updated our medium-term budget assumptions based on the latest information available. This will require us to identify proposals to meet the anticipated gap between our spending needs and our forecast funding.

Unfortunately, the continuation of single year settlements hinder the ability of councils to develop effective spending plans over the medium to long term.

We would like to see a minimum three-year settlement that recognises the scale of the challenges we face and assists with meaningful planning over the medium term.

This will not only benefit our residents, as we can be much clearer about future investment in our services and our localities, it will also enable us to confirm our longer-term funding on to others such as the voluntary sector organisations that do so much for our communities.

Greater certainty of funding is essential as we continue to transform our services to better meet the needs of our residents in a way that ensures we are financially resilient for the future.

Council Tax

Government has permitted local authorities to increase the Council Tax rate by 4.99% in recognition of the difficult financial climate and increased inflationary pressures.

As such the authority is proposing an increase allowed by Government in Council Tax of 4.99%, which includes the 2% adult social care precept.

This increase would contribute around an additional £9.6m per year towards inflationary and demand lead pressures to enable services to be maintained and would represent a Band D level of Council Tax for North Northamptonshire Council of £1,740.22 for 2024/2025.

This is an annual increase of £82.71 (equivalent to £1.59 per week) from the Band D Council Tax level of £1,657.51 in 2023/2024. Around 57% of properties in North Northamptonshire are in Council Tax Bands A and B which will see an annual increase of £55.14 (equating to £1.06 per week) and £64.33 (£1.24 per week) respectively.

These figures do not include the Council Tax for individual Town and Parish Councils or the Council Tax set for Fire and Police by the Northamptonshire Police, Fire and Crime Commissioner.

Council Tax is the most stable form of income that the Council receives, which is important as we enter a period of significant uncertainty around Government funding.

We recognise that increasing Council Tax will inevitably impact on household finances. However, our services are seeing both rising demand and higher costs, and the funding we receive through Council Tax plays an important part in helping to protect those services that individuals, families and our communities value, need and rely on.

There is no change to the Local Council Tax Support Scheme which will continue at 25% (minimum contribution towards Council Tax).

Next steps

This consultation will run from 21 December 2023 until midnight on Friday, 26 January 2024, with the Executive then meeting on 8 February 2024 to consider the final budget proposals for recommendation to Full Council on 22 February 2024.

The main proposals are:

- To increase Council Tax by 4.99%, comprising a 'core' Council Tax increase of 2.99% covering all services and a further 2% for the adult social care precept, which is the maximum amount permitted. This would contribute an additional £9.6m per year and would represent a Band D level of Council Tax of £1,740.22 for 2024/2025, or the equivalent of £33.47 per week.
- Draft Capital Programme 2024-28.

Your feedback on this consultation is really important to us. All consultation feedback will be analysed and considered and will help inform Councillors of residents' and stakeholders' views when making a final decision on the budget at the North Northamptonshire Council Full Council meeting on 22 February 2024. Proposed increase to Council Tax

The Council is proposing to increase Council Tax up to the level currently allowed by the government, without triggering a referendum – 4.99%. This increased rate includes a general increase of 2.99% and the allowable adult social care precept increase, which is 2%.

The Council Tax increase will contribute an additional £9.6m per year towards inflationary and demand pressures to enable services to be maintained.

What would a 4.99% increase mean for Council Tax Bands?

As an example, a Band D level of Council Tax for North Northamptonshire Council of £1,740.22 in 2024/25 is equivalent to £33.47 per week. The annual increase on an average Band D property across the area is £82.71, which is a weekly increase of £1.59p.

Around 57% of properties in North Northamptonshire are in Council Tax Bands A and B. These households would see an annual increase of £55.14 (equating to £1.06 per week) and £64.33 (£1.24 per week) respectively.

These figures do not include the Council Tax for individual town and parish councils or the Council Tax set for fire and police by the Northamptonshire Police, Fire and Crime Commissioner.

With such a large proportion of our income coming from Council Tax – to not increase it, especially when inflation is at exceptionally high levels – would seriously impact our finances going forward and could mean that we would need to consider the revision of some of our services.

The Local Council Tax Reduction Scheme (LCTRS) replaced Council Tax benefit in 2013. Council Tax benefit was a nationally prescribed scheme, whereas LCTRS is a local scheme set at the discretion of the Council. The scheme applies to working age claimants. There is no proposed change to the Local Council Tax Support Scheme which will continue at 25%. Eligible pensioners continue to receive up to 100% Council Tax support depending on the levels of income they receive.

The proposed Council Tax increase of 4.99% relates to two elements - the core increase of 2.99% to support all services and a further 2% for Adult Social Care. The following questions will consider each element in turn.


What would a 2.99% increase mean for Council Tax Bands?

As an example, a 2.99% general increase would result in an increase of £49.56 per year (£0.95 per week) for 2024/25 for the average Band D Council Tax payer.

Strongly agree/ Tend to agree

- Inflation is running high and the additional increase will be needed to provide services.
- The only alternative to increasing Council Tax is cutting services which are already at breaking point
- we need to ensure that we continue to meet the needs of our residents and local services.
- Awareness of historical funding cuts by central government, so funds need to be achieved from somewhere.
- We would like a return of the public services lost through the repetitive cutting of Council ~Tax over the past few years. The purpose of a local authority is to provide public services, not make money which appears to be the reason for current policies
- I cannot see what else can be done.
- Obvious need to increase due to inflation but still feel some expenditure is misguided and wasteful.
- Would tend to agree, because of the amount of funding required to improve our highways infrastructure.
- It is obvious that in times of high inflation the increase is necessary but we need to see results. We have probably the worst roads in the country and we need a vision for and delivery of enhanced Social Care
- If the 2.99% increase is genuinely required to maintain services, I agree it's necessary.
- If we want improved services they have to be paid for.

- With Government funding for the future being uncertain and pressure on local Councils to allocate funding carefully in light of economic volatility and inflationary pressures, I understand why an increase is necessary but it MUST be on the basis that the increase is not used to fund non essential projects, or plug / backfill allocated capital spend from existing funding reserves. This includes projects like the travellers' stopping site at J3 of the A14 nr Rothwell. This is neither essential, necessary or justified. The c£1.3m cap ex could be used much more effectively within the local area for the benefit of local residents and not others, who are transient and not adding value to NNC.

- We get the bins emptied [redacted] for £2500. The roads are a disgrace, there is no public transport and all of the mony goes to your pensions, war chest and the cities.

- Times are hard
- It feels the increase might be ameliorated slightly by a reduction on the costs of running NNC (inc councillors allowances) and costs on running multiple sites in NNC admin? For example, the heating costs of the old ENC building in Thrapston must be substantial when not all the offices are now used?
- Seeing the worsening state of the roads, unactioned reports from residents re: pot holes, gives me no confidence about the council actually investing some money and resources into properly maintaining the roads. Also, instead of seeing patches of tarmac, the whole road should be properly done.
- Parking restrictions, bays not currently monitored in residential areas.
- There's alot of dirty streets in the urban areas of Wellingborough that should be cleaned up by the council, to avoid rats. Residential areas in/around the town centre.
- It is clear that the council continues to live beyond its means and has learnt none of the lessons from when Northants County Council issued a section 114 notice! There should be no increases at all unless it is for statutory services. How on earth can you be suggesting a capital programme of over £169m when the only items listed only come to less than £99m, what is the other £63m being sepnt on, items you do not wish to be public t this stage I assume? If we assume that you will need to borrow only £41m of this, it would cost c. £2m in annual borrowing costs (@average 4.5% pwlb borrowing cost) and then a further a further c£1m in MRP costs, this level of "investment" in what no doubt will be vanity costs is clearly unsustainable and all you are doing is stacking up problems for the future. As for the spend on social care please can you stop funding everything and again only fund what is absolutely statutory which I know you are not currently doing!
- The cost of living affects residents. For the council to get the funding it needs, I
 would prefer to see that money coming from central government to fund councils
 properly. Too many councils are suffering financial crises I see this as a widespread funding issue not specific to Northamptonshire.
- [redacted] any increase will put substantial pressure on my finances. You've already taxed me for the garden waste, you've stopped me going to the local tip [redacted]. The roads are an absolute shambles and I don't believe the figures are acceptable with all the new houses being built round the area, have they been included in the years budget?
- The Council should look at raising the money elsewhere. I would start with cutting the number of councillors to save on expenses etc.
- You already charge too much for a poor level of service and should look to make economies
- Where do you think all this extra money comes from? It's high time you look at what public money you WASTE, and reign some of that back in to fund services.
- This should be REDUCED for [redacted]
- I've not seen a good return on any previous council tax, so until then I will oppose it.
- I do not see why the public should continue to find undemocratic vanity projects that do not offer comparable benefits to the tax paying public. The mismanagement of the library/cornerstone project is a prime example. £7 million to repair the library roof that has been damaged by an adjacent project is egregious abuse of public funds. A cost that is now being passed on to families under immense cost pressures. This cannot be justified while other more critical services such as waste collection and leisure funding are being neglected current service levels are offering little value to the majority
- Because people are already struggling to pay bills and the lowest bands are going to really struggle to pay this. Then I see money thrown away building electric charging points for people who are already rich enough to afford an electric vehicle. Ridiculous.

- The quality of services provided by the council by no means justify the raise. Few points why:
 - corby and surrounding areas have horendous and dangerous road conditions with pot holes everywhere
 - extra payment for green bin recycling already in force
 - schools do jot benefit from any grants or they are not visible, parents have to foot a lot of costs
 - there is absolutely nothing that is bei g done for teenagers or younger kids to do, everytjing that is out there seems prive and or costly to already struggling parents
 - estates that pay monthly fee for maintenance are treated the same as all other estates who dk not need to pay foe maintenance yet still pay the same.
 - fly tipping is on the rise, and rubish is flying everywhere
- You cannot keep increasing our council tax and providing less service the roads get worse the quality of all services get poorer year on year. We should have a reduction.
- the values of properties do not reflect accurately the ability to pay, higher cost of living means people who once had disposable income that allowed them to purchase the property they are now in, no longer have that to justify higher banded council tax
- people are already strapped for cash, for some finding even £1 a week could be difficult, especailly on a fixed low income
- Our council tax increased by a huge amount last year and things that were normally included in it, like brown bin collections, we're taken out, despite an overwhelming opposition!
- Our streets are a mess, we never see a street cleaner. Refuse bins are left out from one month to the next. What happened to enforcing the removal of rubbish bins? Pedestrians have to walk out in the road due to bins and parked cars blocking the pavements. I don't know how disabled in wheelchairs or prams/buggies cope. Is this increase include having to pay for the 'Cornerstone'? Seriously, how can replacing a roof cost millions to do!!
- You waist to much on non essential things
- You keep bleeding us dry, year on year, so instead, cap salaries & councillor payments, reducing staff working hours etc!
- Neither [redacted] or wages have increased this year but food, gas, electric and water has.
- I believe that putting further hardship on the local residents at this time is not correct. This is not just a revenue issue, and cost management appears to have been ignored in the proposal. What organisational efficiency savings have proposed by NNCB to reduced the burden imposed on the local tax payers?
- We simply CANNOT keep sustaining these increases without wage and pension increases to counteract. You councillors are being highly irresponsible, you do not have any interest whatsoever in the people you serve.
- The services received do not support or justify any increase.
- Families are really struggling at the moment with wages and benefits not keeping up with inflation yet your proposal increases in line with recent inflation figures.
 Stop waste and corruption first. Be more efficient.
- No improvements ever seen from increases previously, towns are a mess, roads are a mess
- People are struggling with cost of living pressures with many bills increasing. Any rise in council tax will seriously impact those on low incomes especially
- as increasing council tax when residents are still facing cost of living crisis with food/ulitities still high
- Although additional funding is necessary, particularly highlighted by the closure of Kettering Library and the state of the shopping centre, I strongly disagree with a 2.99% Council Tax increase without first ensuring that current resources are allocated efficiently. The council should focus on creating a more sustainable and

- economically vibrant community that attracts business, which in turn could fund the necessary services without disproportionately impacting residents through tax increases
- Adult social care should not be increased, because most of it is a waste of resources.
- What extra are residents going to get from the constant increase in council tax? Roads are diabolical, the local leisure facilities haven't been updated in many, many years, and we are paying for services that other areas don't, including areas within the North Northants area that didn't previously.
- Why is it always down to us to bale out your poor budgeting. Every year another increase. Everywhere you drive in this county there are new houses being built.
 Where does all this extra revenue go?
- How about u don't pay such ridiculous amounts in wages to the top people? That would save loads
- Struggling to afford any increases. Wages havent gone up. Everything else is. We may need to move out if area
- I literally cannot afford any more expense
- Since the Unitary Council came into being we have had massive increases in our council tax. What we have also seen is no improvement in our services - our roads are atrocious - social care is in crisis. The flip side is our elected councillors have given themselves large increases in their allowances above and beyond what our fantastic public services and NHS workers have been given!
- The roads are appalling and the council is continually wasting money.
- We are supporting far too many people around the world and have forgotten the UK altogether. We are too small and have exceeded our budget by far and it has to stop.
- The name of the council may have changed but the behaviour is the same. You have shown yourselves to be profligate with our money and yet you have the gall to ask for more every year.

- more on food shall I? And yes I have asked but apparently I am not entitled to any assistance despite [redacted]
- Fed up of paying more & getting less! Dog warden was useless when I was bitten
 by a dog. Couldn't even speak to them! The only person I could speak to on the
 phone after trying every option when ringing was the council tax line which still took
 an hour to through. But they were the only people answering their phones surprise! Get back to work!!
- Thought unitary authorities were supposed to be more efficient and have lower costs. Not seen any benefit yet
- The police are not fit for purpose. Every single review of their performance says they need to improve.
- I feel you need to make more in-house saving and spend less on vanity projects
- The police are not fit for purpose so why should we pay extra. Every review of the police says they need to improve.
- Cut back on unimportant nice to have projects concentrate on vital expenditure you
- Rather than increase council tax to local residents perhaps the council should look at what they are spending already. How much is still allocated to the vanity project at Chester House? What is there another 900k to be spent on that over the next few years on top of what they have already spent on the project. Its nothing more than a vanity project for the council and the council should not be propping up any business. Its a bad business plan from day one when it can't reach a profit for the first six years without money from the council.
- Cut your cloth according to your means
- The council needs to balance its books, it is scandalous that the salaries of high rating staff take priority over public services and the financial sustainability is not acceptable, particularly following the reasons for the council split.
- Services decrease and payments increase.

You should be offering us a refund not increasing the rate we pay. As for proposed spending on improving our digital network, WHAT? they are privately run. Electric Vehicle charging points? get with the programme, EV's are dead in the water before they even started.

This is my representation on the Budget Consultation Response to be in by the 26th January and would expect it to be considered at the executive meeting on the 8th February.

My representation/objection to the funding of £1.3 Million to construct a temporary stopping site for travelers at Junction 3 of the A14 Rothwell that Cllr Howes says in his words that the site is likely to stand empty/unused for long periods of time. So no income to pay back the borrowed money. However you dress this up this money is being borrowed at 5.4% that is over 70k per year in interest alone of rate payers money.

They did say at the meeting on the 18th Jan that the money could be found inhouse but this is still borrowed money at 5.4% over the 10 years is £700.000.00p It is an ill thought out project by ClIr Howes at £1.3 million to construct the site and would cost the ratepayers around £270,000 per year to pay back interest, loan and the running costs of the site and there will be other expenses and this would be £2.7 million over 10 years and there will still be on going costs year on year after the 10 years.

The following was not considered properly at the Scrutiny Committee meeting on the 18th January. If we do need a temporary stopping off-site for travelers then a cheaper solution would be to take one of old large layby on the A43 between Kettering and Northampton and convert it into a temporary stopping off point they are large enough to accommodate 10 pitches or more. the hard standings are already there all you would need to do is put gates at each end and a fence around to the road side so the children cannot get to the road and supply a portable toilet shower unit, water supply and electricity supply and this would cost around £50,000 against the £1.3 million and the running cost around 50% less than what is proposed at Rothwell site. Then surely this would be the best solution financially to the council taxpayers and needs to be considered.

[redacted] the costs 50k is a realistic costing for carrying out this work. A saving £1.25 million on the construction cost. When they discussed this at the meeting on the 18th Jan the only thing they could come up with to not to go ahead with this was that the Laybuys on the A43 are near the road and the children could run on the road, which when fenced would be safe, These laybys are large areas and well of the road. Yet Cllr Howes wants to put the site right next to junction 3 of the A14, A6 and the Lorry park which is far more dangerous than the A43. And £1.25 million pounds cheaper. This is only a stopping of site that is unlikely to be used.

There is no excuse for not saving £2.5 million pounds over the 10 years if you use the cheaper alternative.

If this was to go ahead at a 10 year cost in excess off £2.7 million it would be an unacceptable and appalling liability to the Local Council tax payers that will be ongoing year on year. The money should be spent on more important amenities. There is no government requirement for a stopping off site for travelers so we should not be considering spending £2.7 million on one.

This is not Best Value for money and should not be approved. [redacted]

- Inflation is softening and this proposed increase is arbitrary without a proper plan to utilise it.
- The services in Rothwell have been cut and cut again, from regular bin emptying.
 Pathway and road maintenance, cuts to RTCs funding, maintenance and planting,
 mowing, public parks, planting of roundabouts, hedge and tree maintenance, the
 list hoes on,

And now want to build a temporary', stop travellers site at the cost of approximately 1.3 million pounds, and the promise that it probably will never be used, on a greenfield site, when no evidence that other sites, a lot more suitable and cheaper, have ever been seriously considered, seems to be a blatant waste of taxpayers hard earned money

- You are proposing to spend £1,300,000 on a traveler's site on Rothwell's beautiful green space. How on earth can you have the cheek to increase everyone's council tax when you're wasting it on things that will: increase crime in the local area, greywash green areas & put local businesses and residents at risk of crime. In a time when the government is telling us to protect the planet you are actively trying to destroy the the green areas that residents of Rothwell use. How many councillors live in close proximity of this site? If you did I guarantee this would not be happening. I have no problem paying more council taxes if the money was being used for public services, however this is an abomination and a complete backwards step.

- Current rate of council tax does not offer value for money for single person households. Consideration should be given to reducing the rate for single person households and charged on a per person rate to ensure the rate payable is fair and proportionate.
- Unable to afford an increase. Completely object to £1.3m being proposed on a temporary travellers site on my doorstep. The £1.3m could be spent on better things or even not spent at all so we don't have an increase in our council tax
- Temporary travellers site in Rothwell is not value for money and means the destruction of a green field site. Travellers don't want it either and costs over £1 million.
- You claim that inflation has been at "exceptionally high levels" it hasn't (I remember it being at 25%) and certainly isn't as of now (below 4%) so justifying this increase for next year only based on this is basically wrong. Q. If you feel this proposal would have a negative impact, please tell us what you think that impact would be, along with any suggestions on how any potential negative impacts could be reduced or avoided?

There were 137 responses to this question.

- As above, you are asking the working people to pay more, when their wages have not increased, yet the people on benfits have had additional funding but their payments stay the same.
- Public will not like it as they do not see the physical impact it will have such as on roads as that is a big complaint currently due to potholes.
- take a walk down [redacted] open your eyes and tell me that its having a positive impact on the community, ask the residents.
- Unfortunately the increase will put additional strain on many struggling households.
 I do not believe there is scope to make cuts to budgets without adversely affecting services

- The proposal, whilst it may help to improve services if funds were used effectively, will impact residents who are already struggling in the current economic climate. Also, employees are again being given a pay increase which in effect only helps to cover some of the increase in council tax.
- Cost of living
- The long delay in sorting out the pay structure has resulted in a great many "consultants/contractors" working within the Council. These consultants are being paid a great deal more than persons in permanent equivalent post. This has caused some understandable unrest. The delay has no doubt caused a great increase in the wage bill, which is large proportion of any budget. It is felt that the wage re-structure should have been a priority.
- The general public can just about manage with the amount of tax already taken from their earnings. This increase no matter how 'small' will have a negative impact on individuals and families.
- We can't afford it. It's written in terms of only being 'x' amount extra a week but it adds up.
- Already stretched financially.

- Budgets are extremely stretched especially for the disabled, elderly and vulnerable, you as a local authority already struggle to cater to the needs of this group this is a further kicking while they're down
- As above the negative impacts are that you are causing people to choose between food and going to court
- Last year your increased it by 4.99%. You removed services and then charged us
 more. We can see deterioration every where. We used to be able to come into the
 council and speak to people. This has been stopped. You have now invested our
 money in pushing everyone on the phone or internet. Yet charge more. Since staff
 from Northampton took over everything has got worse without exception.
- If people had a choice of food on the table, heating their homes, or emptying a bin I
 think we all know what they would prioritise.
- Increase a smaller percentage
- If people are going to default on a bill then I feel that Council Tax is likely to be the one that people would not pay. Surely if people cannot afford to pay their council tax then you are not going to generate the revenue from it that you expect. I think a better way of raising the revenue is to stop paying consultants who live outside of the local area to come in commanding ridiculously large payments to reform services and stop awarding the highest paid members of the local authority pay rises. Listen to the views of current LA employees on how services can be streamlined and improved. Pay the skilled staff who work in the low paid services such as early years, education and care roles a wage that makes them feel valued and reduce the need to pay high agency fees to fill gaps in schools and EY settings. This will encourage staff retention and wellbeing and make less of a dent in your budget.
- The negative impact is that an increase will see a lot of people who just can not afford to pay, they will be bad debtors and the rest will have to cover the cost. The Council needs to reduce its employees, it is over manned in many ways.
- NNC should seek to balance their budget without relying on already-stretched households to bear the cost burden. NNC's Band D council tax is already above the national average.
- You present this as a small increase, and yet essentials such a police and fire are a separate and addition precept. What do we get out of income tax? As you will not give the people a vote in a referendum perhaps the failure of Councils to make ends meet might send the right message.

- People are already struggling, maybe streamline the services rather than keep increasing everything and wasting money
- you are also rising fees and charges so you are just adding and adding a burden to households some of whom will fail to pay and increase the pressure on your services

- People are already struggling to pay the Council tax and other bills. This increase would really stretch their budgets and livelihoods to the brink. Pensioners struggle, families are struggling (unless they're in the high earners group).

This is my representation on the Budget Consultation Response to be in by the 26th January and would expect it to be considered at the executive meeting on the 8th February.

My representation/objection to the funding of £1.3 Million to construct a temporary stopping site for travelers at Junction 3 of the A14 Rothwell that Cllr Howes says in his words that the site is likely to stand empty/unused for long periods of time. So no income to pay back the borrowed money. However you dress this up this money is being borrowed at 5.4% that is over 70k per year in interest alone of rate payers money.

They did say at the meeting on the 18th Jan that the money could be found inhouse but this is still borrowed money at 5.4% over the 10 years is £700.000.00p It is an ill thought out project by Cllr Howes at £1.3 million to construct the site and would cost the ratepayers around £270,000 per year to pay back interest, loan and the running costs of the site and there will be other expenses and this would be £2.7 million over 10 years and there will still be on going costs year on year after the 10 years.

The following was not considered properly at the Scrutiny Committee meeting on the 18th January. If we do need a temporary stopping off-site for travelers then a cheaper solution would be to take one of old large layby on the A43 between Kettering and Northampton and convert it into a temporary stopping off point they are large enough to accommodate 10 pitches or more, the hard standings are already there all you would need to do is put gates at each end and a fence around to the road side so the children cannot get to the road and supply a portable toilet shower unit, water supply and electricity supply and this would cost around £50,000 against the £1.3 million and the running cost around 50% less than what is proposed at Rothwell site. Then surely this would be the best solution financially to the council taxpayers and needs to be considered.

[redacted] the costs 50k is a realistic costing for carrying out this work. A saving £1.25 million on the construction cost. When they discussed this at the meeting on the 18th Jan the only thing they could come up with to not to go ahead with this was that the Laybuys on the A43 are near the road and the children could run on the road, which when fenced would be safe, These laybys are large areas and well of the road. Yet Cllr Howes wants to put the site right next to junction 3 of the A14, A6 and the Lorry park which is far more dangerous than the A43. And £1.25 million pounds cheaper. This is only a stopping of site that is unlikely to be used. There is no excuse for not saving £2.5 million pounds over the 10 years if you use

the cheaper alternative.

If this was to go ahead at a 10 year cost in excess off £2.7 million it would be an unacceptable and appalling liability to the Local Council tax payers that will be ongoing year on year. The money should be spent on more important amenities. There is no government requirement for a stopping off site for travelers so we should not be considering spending £2.7 million on one.

This is not Best Value for money and should not be approved. [redacted]

A reduction in the percentage, as this could put a struggle on peoples finances, as i previously mentioned a reduction in services from the council over the past few years does not justify an increase such as this one.


What would a 2% increase mean Council Tax Bands?

This is my representation on the Budget Consultation Response to be in by the 26th January and would expect it to be considered at the executive meeting on the 8th February.

My representation/objection to the funding of £1.3 Million to construct a temporary stopping site for travelers at Junction 3 of the A14 Rothwell that Cllr Howes says in his words that the site is likely to stand empty/unused for long periods of time. So no income to pay back the borrowed money. However you dress this up this money is being borrowed at 5.4% that is over 70k per year in interest alone of rate payers money.

They did say at the meeting on the 18th Jan that the money could be found inhouse but this is still borrowed money at 5.4% over the 10 years is £700.000.00p It is an ill thought out project by ClIr Howes at £1.3 million to construct the site and would cost the ratepayers around £270,000 per year to pay back interest, loan and the running costs of the site and there will be other expenses and this would be £2.7 million over 10 years and there will still be on going costs year on year after the 10 years.

The following was not considered properly at the Scrutiny Committee meeting on the 18th January. If we do need a temporary stopping off-site for travelers then a cheaper solution would be to take one of old large layby on the A43 between Kettering and Northampton and convert it into a temporary stopping off point they are large enough to accommodate 10 pitches or more, the hard standings are already there all you would need to do is put gates at each end and a fence around to the road side so the children cannot get to the road and supply a portable toilet shower unit, water supply and electricity supply and this would cost around £50,000 against the £1.3 million and the running cost around 50% less than what is proposed at Rothwell site. Then surely this would be the best solution financially to the council taxpayers and needs to be considered.

[redacted] the costs 50k is a realistic costing for carrying out this work. A saving £1.25 million on the construction cost. When they discussed this at the meeting on the 18th Jan the only thing they could come up with to not to go ahead with this was that the Laybuys on the A43 are near the road and the children could run on the road, which when fenced would be safe, These laybys are large areas and well of the road. Yet Cllr Howes wants to put the site right next to junction 3 of the A14,

A6 and the Lorry park which is far more dangerous than the A43. And £1.25 million pounds cheaper. This is only a stopping of site that is unlikely to be used.

There is no excuse for not saving £2.5 million pounds over the 10 years if you use the cheaper alternative.

If this was to go ahead at a 10 year cost in excess off £2.7 million it would be an unacceptable and appalling liability to the Local Council tax payers that will be ongoing year on year. The money should be spent on more important amenities. There is no government requirement for a stopping off site for travelers so we should not be considering spending £2.7 million on one.

This is not Best Value for money and should not be approved. [redacted]

This is my representation on the Budget Consultation Response to be in by the 26th January and would expect it to be considered at the executive meeting on the 8th February.

My representation/objection to the funding of £1.3 Million to construct a temporary stopping site for travelers at Junction 3 of the A14 Rothwell that Cllr Howes says in his words that the site is likely to stand empty/unused for long periods of time. So no income to pay back the borrowed money. However you dress this up this money is being borrowed at 5.4% that is over 70k per year in interest alone of rate payers money.



Feedback received via letters / emails

There were nine written responses received.

Are the savings and efficiencies referred already in the pipeline for implementation and hence fully deliverables in 24/25 and future years?

Other than through the budget setting process have all proposals for savings/efficiency that impact on customers, residents been subject to separate consultation exercises. Aware the Council got itself into a mess with School Transport recently due to inadequate consultation and failing to recognise local views/opinions. So savings undeliverable...

or are efficiency and savings "cuts" or additional "income generation" by another name that are still being explored or subject to further consultation. Ie just pipe dreams to help balance the budget)just like the former NCC built into its budget and lead to its S114 notice)

Basically are savings robust and deliverable next year - how have your governance arrangements provided Councillors with the appropriate Assurances?

[redacted] I am aware originally your officers argued that the changes to school transport for Thrapston children was in part to help deliver savings in its budget. Although this appeared to have be ignored when the Council back tracked on its decision after pressure from Parents and Others due to the lack of consultation and local insight.

So would you confirm the budget and MTFS includes on going funding for free school transport for Thrapston children to continue to attend PWS over the medium term without further "significant" increases in the fee for 6th formers and there are not plans to end the free offer in the Medium Term plan. And you're not revisiting the issue (like NCC did with 3 tier education in East Northants) as you didn't succeed the 1st time!

Basic necessities like improved quality of social housing, children's services, Kettering's library etc need to take priority over pet projects like Chester House.

The original purpose of the councillor/officer relationship was that the officer implemented the wishes of the electorate as gleaned by the councillor. The councillors I known either sit in an officers pocket or are held at such length as to be rendered almost ineffective. The structure and relationships within NNC need vastly improving and this will improve the effectiveness of the service.

This is my representation on the Budget Consultation Response to be in by the 26th January and would expect it to be considered at the executive meeting on the 8th February.

My representation/objection to the funding of £1.3 Million to construct a temporary stopping site for travelers at Junction 3 of the A14 Rothwell that Cllr Howes says in his words that the site is likely to stand empty/unused for long periods of time. So no income to pay back the borrowed money. However you dress this up this money is being borrowed at 5.4% that is over 70k per year in interest alone of rate payers money.

They did say at the meeting on the 18th Jan that the money could be found inhouse but this is still borrowed money at 5.4% over the 10 years is £700.000.00p

It is an ill thought out project by Cllr Howes at £1.3 million to construct the site and would cost the ratepayers around £270,000 per year to pay back interest, loan and the running costs of the site and there will be other expenses and this would be £2.7 million over 10 years and there will still be on going costs year on year after the 10 years.

The following was not considered properly at the Scrutiny Committee meeting on the 18th January. If we do need a temporary stopping off-site for travelers then a cheaper solution would be to take one of old large layby on the A43 between Kettering and Northampton and convert it into a temporary stopping off point they are large enough to accommodate 10 pitches or more, the hard standings are already there all you would need to do is put gates at each end and a fence around to the road side so the children cannot get to the road and supply a portable toilet shower unit, water supply and electricity supply and this would cost around £50,000 against the £1.3 million and the running cost around 50% less than what is proposed at Rothwell site. Then surely this would be the best solution financially to the council taxpayers and needs to be considered.

[redacted] the costs 50k is a realistic costing for carrying out this work. A saving £1.25 million on the construction cost. When they discussed this at the meeting on the 18th Jan the only thing they could come up with to not to go ahead with this was that the Laybuys on the A43 are near the road and the children could run on the road, which when fenced would be safe, These laybys are large areas and well of the road. Yet Cllr Howes wants to put the site right next to junction 3 of the A14, A6 and the Lorry park which is far more dangerous than the A43. And £1.25 million pounds cheaper. This is only a stopping of site that is unlikely to be used.

There is no excuse for not saving £2.5 million pounds over the 10 years if you use the cheaper alternative.

If this was to go ahead at a 10 year cost in excess off £2.7 million it would be an unacceptable and appalling liability to the Local Council tax payers that will be ongoing year on year. The money should be spent on more important amenities.

There is no government requirement for a stopping off site for travelers so we should not be considering spending £2.7 million on one.

This is not Best Value for money and should not be approved.

After a failed attempt to request further consultation on this matter as a Parish Councillor I strongly object to the amount allocated in the budget to the above matter. In view of a possible logistics terminal being constructed adjoining the site I cannot see that this is a reasonable location for a traveller stopping site. It can only be a waste of money should the logistics site go ahead the traveller site must only cause interference in any construction. To my mind it's putting the cart before the horse. We need decisions on the proposed logistics site before attempting to provide a temporary stopping site.

NNC must revisit their manner of recording complaints and controlling contracts to ensure that value for money is achieved and that matters of concern are included in future expenditure plans.

Recent Wall Coping Stone repairs at NN14 2RB have been carried out on inadequately prepared bricks.

Previous repairs were carried out using plaster-like material instead of mortar.

Fixing with a weak material hastens the need for many of the stones to require repeated repairs.

Three contractors spent approximately three hours, some of which were spent in the cab eating lunch.

There was no evidence that any of the substandard material had been removed.

It was anticipated the flatbed truck would contain a quantity of the removed material ready for disposal.

The truck did not contain any removed material that would have been visible in the relatively tidy open rear compartment.

The new complaints system can follow through to work orders for subjects worthy of action.

However, the council deliberately breaks this system by changing the reference number when it is next actioned.

When a communication is sent back to the originator of the problem, there is no efficient way to link and file the communications.

Even worse is that an individual's wording identifies communications sent to and from NNC staff who are responsible for progressing the matter.

This seems to be part of the plan to make it challenging for complaint originators to manage the submissions they make.

This is tantamount to reverting to the council's previous decisions not to identify complaints.

This enables the council to 'forget' problems and ensure that important subjects are not on hand for inclusion in upcoming expenditure plans.

[redacted] Having heard all the comments, we felt there did seem a certain amount of secrecy with regard to the council proposing to forward an application for the planning permission in December, it seemed to have been "hurried through" the explanation given last Thursday didn't seem to hold much weight.

We have no issues with travellers requiring temporary sites, it's just that this particular sight has the abundance of wildlife, where we also learnt on Thursday, there were also 4 rare species there. We understand the councillor who is in contact with the travellers pointing out that, they too are a rare species, but how lucky they are that they can speak up, the wildlife can't.

We are lead to believe from our group, that the other proposed sites would be absolutely fine and indeed cost somewhat less to create, here also, there seemed a certain amount of secrecy surrounding these sites.

We await further information, and hope this is resolved with everything taken into account.

Proposed travellers site at Rothwell

I am writing to request further consideration to the proposed site, as above.

I believe that this site is not suitable for the proposal for several reasons.

Firstly, from an environmental perspective, this is one of the few green places we have left around the town. With the recent development at Woodland Valley, a huge piece of countryside has been concreted over, and the impact to wildlife is already overwhelming. [redacted] see a range of wildlife including several species of birds, bats and other animals like Hares, Rabbits, etc.

further damage to our green area would be more damaging, not only to the wildlife but also the human population of our small town! Where to walk that is free of pollution? [redacted], I'm am so very concerned about this and feel that this must be further considered.

Secondly, from a safety perspective, we have recently had the Truck Stop opened at Junction 3. This has increased the already heavy traffic in the locality. Some mornings it is very difficult to get onto the roundabout at A6/J3, and I am seeing close shaves and accidents on a regular basis. Any further increase in traffic attempting to access this already busy junction will again increase the risk of accidents and also pollution, with vehicles idling at the roundabout.

Additionally, during peak travelling times, we are already seeing traffic queueing to exit the A14 and with the amount of lorries using this extremely busy road, it won't be long before there are further serious accidents.

I implore you to reconsider this siting, for the benefit of the people of this town and also the environment for our wildlife.

Rothwell travellers site at J3 A 14

This should be stopped as it is unworkable. It is a fantasy to think that travellers will only stay for 3 weeks. You will need an on site manager to police their entry and length of stay. They will need to not be allowed to trash the place or leave loads of rubbish that Rothwell Town Council has to pay for clearing. The police have enough to do without and extra place to continually have issues with. A site like this needs permanent and proper funding and a manager living on site to stop unsocial behaviour and it becoming a NO Go areathis is not needed in Rothwell- I seriously object to it. [redacted]

Rothwell - Temporary traveller site

I would have to question how essential this is, and whether it is more important than other critical services, especially given that all Councils are under budgetary constraints including NNC.

It does not seem clear how this has been given priority over other essential services, as it feels like a convenient way to dispose of land that the Council appear to have no other use for.

Have Housing Associations been approached to see if it would be appropriate for Social Housing?
